RTD seeks public feedback for proposed May service changes

Virtual meeting options available starting March 3; service changes go into effect May 25

DENVER (Feb. 11, 2025) — The [Regional Transportation District \(RTD\)](#) is providing customers the opportunity to share feedback on the [proposed May service changes](#). Customer feedback is important to ensure a more efficient and responsive system that serves community needs. The proposed changes are formulated to improve reliability and on-time performance and address seasonal school adjustments. Several changes are proposed to advance the RTD System Optimization Plan (SOP) which identifies improvements to the transit network to better meet the needs of customers.

The proposed changes will take effect Sunday, May 25. Two virtual meetings, both via Zoom, and one “Ask a Service Planner” virtual meeting will be held on the dates below. The Ask a Service Planner meeting on March 4 is an opportunity for customers to ask questions and speak directly with an RTD service planner to talk about proposed changes.

The [Regional Transportation District](#) (RTD) was created in 1969 by the Colorado General Assembly to develop, operate and maintain a mass transportation system that now benefits more than 3.1 million people in the Denver metro area. With a service area of 2,342 square miles, RTD provides transit services in all or part of eight counties and more than 40 municipalities. The transportation agency's services are delivered via 126 bus routes, six light rail lines, four commuter rail lines and paratransit mobility options.
